Chairman's Message

Welcome to the first edition of a new look, revamped BHRC Racing Calendar, a publication which I hope will evolve as an enjoyable and informative read with both domestic and international harness racing features and news.

This publication would not be possible without the excellent Media and Promotions team of Sarah Thomas, Mandy Stanley, Julie Park, Karen Valentine and Kayleigh Evans - a true Group 1 line up!

It is with great pleasure the BHRC welcome Heulwen Bulman as Secretary to our organisation, an asset indeed to the sport, someone many of you will be familiar with from her days of successfully administrating the big Aberystwyth meeting. Heulwen is extremely well qualified for the role and has the extra advantage of possessing an in depth knowledge of the sport, working from home, she will be ably assisted by our Office Administrator Hollie Sutcliffe.

Hollie has been working tirelessly recently during this time of transition and deserves our gratitude for her excellent

contribution to our sport.
As I am sure you aware, recently we have formed committees for various aspects of the business, such as Media & Promotions, Development and Stewarding. It is hoped we set up a committee for Finance and Handicapping soon.

We are currently negotiating a Live Streaming project, involving Tir Prince, York and Tregaron, three tracks that can potentially deliver the requirements of the off course bookmaking community, that is the regular provision of 10 horse fields.

It is possible we may have to make some amendments to fixtures to accommodate this project, what I can tell you at this stage Raslab, the company acting on our sport's behalf negotiating, have entered talks with potential foreign clients.

Recently, I had the privilege of attending the UET General Assembly as an Observer representing Great Britain, an interesting experience indeed, learning about the prosperity, promotion and governance of trotting - food for thought as we look to restructure our organisation in order to gain more European support.

As we limber up for the 2020 Season, a review of the Stewarding Model is taking place, to ensure the highest standard of policing and integrity for our sport, this will include the video recording of inquiries. I would like to introduce Stipendiary Stewards to all our meetings, however due to the cost of such a program, this may need to be deferred for the time being.

There are amendments to the Rule Book as we take the integrity of our sport extremely seriously.

Another proposal is for a structure to our entry system, eg for a Saturday meeting, the Race Framer to organise the races on a Monday, publish a Start sheet on Tuesday which will give connections a day to confirm driver bookings, the card with all he drivers will then be published on the website on Wednesday.

Basically, I am keen to reduce the number of day of racing driver changes, with changes only permitted in exceptional circumstances.

In another development, I suggest

tracks advertise their proposed races 14 days ahead of race day, giving connections the opportunity to make plans.

One of the big talking points is our Constitution, and amendments, including one person, one vote. It is the intention of the BHRC to implement the 'new' voting system ahead of the next AGM and work is now underway on the changes.

It is hoped many of you will show your support by attending the Awards Evening on March 21st, details of which can be found in this publication.

Here's hoping for a successful season and on a positive note, the continuation of the Musselburgh Meeting is to be welcomed and supported by us all.

Keep watching out for the regular updates on the BHRC Website and on Facebook.

The Breeders Crown UK & Ireland finals 2019 had a real international flavour



with horses from Scotland, England, Ireland and Wales taking part.
Not just taking part but taking part competitively.

It rained relentlessly for 24 hours, but as if by magic it stopped just before racing was due to start. Nothing short of a miracle! It was the biggest crowd Tir Prince has had this year so far, and they were not to be disappointed as the racing was second to none. The prize money was the highest that the UK or Ireland for juvenile home bred horse. This is the first time the Breeders Crown held its own, with no need for added races as we were treated to 4 Heats and 6 Finals and it was another first for the 4YOs having enough horses entered for the Mares division to hold heats.

The first final of the night was the 2YO Fillies Group 1 Race which was won by a first timer round Tir Prince over the water from Ireland, Bernard Nicholson with a drive to victory on Churchview Niche. To say all the

connections were delighted with the win is an understatement as they took home £6,000 as 1st prize on the night.

The second final was the start of the Laidlers/ Huschkas wins with the 2YO Matteuceous taking the £6,000 prize followed quickly by a win in the 4YO Colts division with Merrington Movinup and the final race of the night, the 4YO Mare's final with Rhyds Reflection.

In Between this we had time to cheer on the popular Scottish winner Loose Change winning at 3/1 defeating the courageous Newtown Jody the favourite at 4 to 1 on. Loose Change is trained and owned by Hamish Muirhead and was driven to victory my Hugh Menzies.

Another popular winner in the 3YO Colts & Geldings category coming from Ireland, but the north this time in the shape of Ladyford Dollar and the Stewart Family, Walter and Carmel as the proud owners.

Top honours went to Alexis Laidler as Top Trainer, Rocker Laidler, Top Driver. The Top 2YO Sire and Top Stallion overall went to Foreclosure.

The Committee have passed a ruling where entries must close for all meetings at least 5 days/4 nights prior to race day, with all Start Sheets displayed on BHRC

Website at least 4 days/3 nights prior to race day and all driver changes on the race card published on the BHRC Website at least 3 days/ 2 nights prior to race day. (Some tracks may prefer to activate these measures earlier).

All driver changes on race day will incur a £25 penalty, unless exceptional circumstances (to be defined).



Grand Prix d'Amerique 2020

This year was the 100th staging of the biggest race in the French trotting calendar – indeed the biggest trotting event in the world – the Grand Prix d'Amerique. I have never been before, despite earmarking the date for the past 3 years, so when I was contacted by Steve Wolf at Harnesslink last September to be part of a media team covering the event alongside Steve and Heather Vitale, naturally I jumped at the chance.

My access-all-areas media pass gave me just that – access to all areas. Thankfully I've been to Vincennes twice before in addition to having the day before the PDA at the track so I knew my way around the paddock well enough to be able to hunt down the 18 equine stars of the show as soon as I arrived on the Sunday morning.

The entire day is geared towards the main event – the supporting card seems to fly by in a blur while the media follows the superstars of the trotting world around, interviewing





connections for their thoughts on their chances in the race to trying to catch a glimpse of the preparations to each of the runners. One thing that struck me from watching the owners, trainers, drivers and grooms of the 18 runners was the level of appreciation each of them showed their charges whether they knew they were being watched or not. Whilst trotting is a major industry in France, at the heart of it all lies the simple love of a horse and language barriers aside, that is what unites us in this sport.

It was clear from very early on that Bold Eagle, Breeders Crown Champion on Canadian soil in October 2019, is

somewhat a fan favourite. His stablemate and eventual winner Face Time Bourbon was slightly overlooked by fans and the media before the race as everyone jostled at the temporary barriers to see Bold Eagle relaxing in his stable. Jean-Michel Bazire, who fielded 3 runners in the form of 2019 PDA winner Belina Josselyn, 2019 PDA runner up Davidson Du Pont and the stunning Looking Superb, is quite clearly an international celebrity too, and the flurry of activity around his section of the paddock as his horses arrived was like nothing I've ever seen before.

I nearly missed the pre-race show

due to trying to capture Propulsion on camera in the furthest part of the paddock from the grandstand, but managed to get back to the designated photographers area trackside in time to see the 18 drivers being presented to the crowd. It isn't just the Prix d'Amerique itself which is a spectacle to behold; it is the build-up and the crowd participation which really captures the imagination. I've been fortunate enough to witness a whole host of top level Standardbred and Thoroughbred races in the flesh but what made this event stand apart from everything I have witnessed before was the detail and the level of preparation that went in to making the day about more than just the race. It is a massive celebration and that celebratory feeling seeps into the near 40,000-strong crowd so that by the time the race goes off, the crowd is almost in a state of frenzy.

Usually when I'm working with my camera at harness meetings here in the UK, I'm stood away from the crowd a little and it is only in the closing stages of a race that I can begin to hear connections of horses cheer them home. At Vincennes, I had a wall of people behind me, American and French flags held aloft, and the noise that they made as a collective as the field of runners turned for home was deafening. It

was hard for me to pick a horse to cheer on myself because there were so many I wanted to support – Bold Eagle after having watched him win the Breeders Crown at Mohawk, Belina Josselyn because I'm a huge fan of mares in general, Davidson Du Pont because he had come so close the year before, Face Time Bourbon because he was the unexposed young pretender...in the end I just clicked and hoped and soaked up the atmosphere as Face Time Bourbon and Swedish driver Bjorn Goop cruised to the line to victory.

The immediate aftermath of the race was as crazy as the build-up and the race itself. We spilled on to the track trying to capture the emotional connections of the winner on camera. They really went to town on the presentation to the winning owner, trainer and driver, it was a huge celebration that lasted for a long time on the track. As I headed back to the paddock ahead of the throng of media people surrounding Bjorn Goop I spotted Face Time Bourbon being led, without fanfare, to the cooling down ring. So I followed him. In amongst all of that chaos, with everyone wanting to get their soundbite from the winning driver, I took solace in the quietest part of the whole racetrack and admired a champion.

BHRC performers an asset to North American Racing

The story of the moment and perhaps of the last season is the success of British and Irish horses in North America. The fairy-tale started at the end of 2018 with **Robyn Camden**, **Reclamation** and the lesser known **Rebel Rouser** making a successful journey to the land of hopes and dreams.

Robyn Camden was somewhat of a superstar here in the UK and Ireland and it is great to see that her success has continued overseas. In the 2019 season she won \$192,940 and she is already off the mark in 2020 winning her seasonal debut.

The decision to send the Bill Donavon owned and Tadgh Murphy trained pair, of Reclamation and Rebel Rouser was not a complete surprise as this was something always on the American owner's agenda.

Following the success of this trio it left many others wondering if they too had horses in their stable who could justify making the trans-Atlantic trip.

The evolution of **Evenwood Sonofagun** throughout the last five seasons has captured the imagination of many a harness racing fan. With 24 wins including two Crock of Gold finals, five handicap finals and a personal best of 1.54.9 under his belt alongside the under saddle world record he set at York in 2017, the decision came in September 2019 to send the son of The Firepan to Canada. Not wanting to miss

out both Alexis and Rocker Laidler joined him for a number of weeks over the winter months and their trainer/driver combination got him into the winner's enclosure at Mohawk in a time of 1.51.2. Since then while in the care of Colin Johnson, Rocker has had the opportunity to return and drive the horse that the leading trainer/driver duo clearly adored.

Another of the Laidler camp to cross the pond is **Matticulous**, who after winning the Famous Musselburgh Pace was booked to go stateside. The son of leading UK broodmare Another Mattie started his campaign with Ron Burke notching up six victories before recently moving to Colin Johnson's barn. The gelding owned by the RKB & Morgans syndicate has provided his owners with a brilliant experience with Shon Morgans stating that they have never really had a plan for him and sent him out to the US to see how he got on.

Winner of the STAGBI Mares Golden Girls final **Olivia Camden** is another who has made the move but at the time of writing is yet to make her debut. New trainer Rene Allard has stated that she is training well and will likely qualify in March and formulate a plan from there. So far he is impressed by the daughter of Pro Bono Best and Yankee Jiffey and considers her to have a lot of potential.



Catching on to the success of the UK and Irish imports was Mark Weaver and Ron Burke. The owner/ trainer duo had built relationship with Derek Delaney over the last seven or so years. Delaney's Oakwood Stud purchased their current stallion Foreclosure from them. Derek saw it as a natural progression that he became their agent when looking to purchase horses from this part of the world.

The selection process involved looking into around 40 horses that were three year old or over with a decent record and money on their card. Contact was made with owners of those with a consistent race record of sub 2.00 minute miles that

had competed in and won stakes or group races to see if they would consider selling their horses and at what price. If the numbers added up between the price of the horse and the race record they took a chance and their flights were booked. Those that have made the trip within this consignment are Porterstown Chris, Itsmycheck, Father Ted, Oakwoodinittowinit, Greenhill Debatable and Greenhill Hanover.

Porterstown Chris is a performer at the highest level in the UK and Ireland and has recorded many sub two minute miles. The departure of Chris was sure to be an emotional one for the Dunne family but celebrations will be memorable when makes it into the winner's enclosure.

Itsmycheck has been one of the most consistent horses over the last few seasons notching up 13 wins and 23 placings. Unfortunately he had reached a grade in the UK which suffers from a lack of racing. The Walker family considered him a fraction off Crock of Gold class but the alternative would have been trailing each race. Although they admit it was a very hard decision they felt that this gave the horse the best opportunity to continue to race within his own class.

Marc Jones is well known for having some quality stock so it was unsurprising that he had a horse on the wanted list. Father Ted was not the most straight forward horse to get racing and has got Marc into some entertaining situations. He stated that he'd run around the track in his underpants if he could get the son of Conquest into the winners enclosure, the rest as they say is history! 'Ted' now goes to the Burke barn who have also trained his brother Transcending (\$906.328 Grinfromeartoear). The Jones family are eager to see how the top trainer will get on with his sibling and are hopeful that Burke's style of training will really suit him.

Oakwoodinittowinit is a former BHRC 2 Year Old of the Year who has contested at the highest level



within his age category. His performance to win at the second meeting at York in 2019 was on its own likely to be enough to secure his ticket.

The owner of **Greenhill Debatable** and **Greenhill Hanover** was contemplating whether to train them or breed them for the 2020 season. With new stock coming through and the handicapper catching up to them the opportunity to sell and give both the chance to return to US soil was too hard to turn down.

When asked if Derek Delaney thought there would be an opportunity to export more horses in the future he stated that he thinks this is a great opportunity and as long as owners are realistic and the horses that have made the journey do reasonably well the trade will open up. He added that they don't all have to be superstars at the top level in order for the deal to work out. As long as the buyers and sellers are making some money and the figures are adding up the future looks bright for the UK and Irish exports to the USA.

To continue with the British and Irish interest some owners have opted to go with West Cork born and bred trainer Robert Cleary who now resides in New Jersey. Robert is currently training 18 horses and last season passed the \$1 million earnings mark for the first time, firmly putting his name out there. His highest rated individual is Rodeo Rock a Rock n Roll Heaven gelding with lifetime earnings of over \$700,000. The 7 year old contested the Levy series

last season finishing a very good second in the final and all being well that will be his target again this spring. Obviously a fan of the breed, Robert also trains his two year old American Ideal brother who was purchased for an impressive \$280,000 in Harrisburg.

Among those adding to the earnings tally was Rebel Rouser who proved to be a solid addition to the Cleary stable. He notched up an impressive twelve victories under Robert's care before being sold at the Harrisburg sales in October.

As one previously IHRA and BHRC raced horse left his stable another one arrived in the form of **Blackwell Ruby**. The daughter of Kikikolt is making a name for herself in the restricted class events (i.e winners of less than a certain amount/number of wins) and the plan is to give her a break once she races through these. The hope is that she will then be good enough to take on the older mares. Cleary thinks the future is bright for Ruby, a sentiment that was echoed by her regular driver Jim Marohn Jr.

In the absence of these horses both our Crock of Gold and STAGBI Golden Girls series are going to look considerably different. That being said this provides an ideal opportunity for new contenders to step into the lime light. Although we will miss seeing these horses race on our shores the prospect of brighter futures lie ahead. Hats off to those who took the plunge and long may our overseas success continue. From Harness Racing to ITV Racing



Stevie Lees is a household within the harness name racing community but now Stephen Lees junior bids to be a household name nationwide. The 15 year old was selected to be involved in the ITV Racing Mini Me's feature in a bid to find stars of the future. along with four Stephen. others aged between eight and fifteen mimic ITV Racing's presenters Ed Chamberlin, Alice Plunkett, Matt Chapman and Oli Bell and commentator Richard Hoiles.

Stephen who has become a regular on the microphone at harness racing events across the country initially heard about the contest through Facebook when members of the harness racing community, knowing that he was the ideal person for the job, tagged him in links. competition set up by Cheltenham Racecourse required hopefuls to audition by sending in some VT of themselves. Sarah Thomas was kind enough to put together a Stephen's collection of commentary's and Facebook live videos alongside Darren Owen. This secured his place and the five



selected were then matched to one of the five ITV Racing team.

Stephen began his commentary career calling a qualifier at York at the end of 2017. He then became involved in the BHRC Pony Racing becoming the regular commentator for the junior events and showing a real knack for getting the crowd involved. In 2019 he got the opportunity to call his first full card of races at Presteigne.

Having witnessed Stephen's excellent commentary skills over the past couple of season's mini Richard Hoiles would have seemed the

obvious choice but his confident and witty personality made him a perfect match for Matt Chapman. Stephen himself initially wanted commentators' role but after receiving word of who he would be partnered with he watched videos of Matt Chapman and realised he really was a mini Matt. The pair clicked, making the experience all the more enjoyable and Stephen's sister Kellie even managed to get him to jump on the 'Vote Reggie' bandwagon via an Instagram video.

Speaking of Instagram that's how Stephen and Matt communicate before each fixture and plan their outfits to ensure they were a perfectly



matched little and large. The one question that ITV did ask before the first meeting was whether he owned a pair of long brown boots, which led to a shopping day for mum Lisa.



The competition was spread over three Cheltenham fixtures between November and January. Each day consisted of arriving by 10.30 where you'd have a chance to say a quick hello to everyone before going over the plan for the day. The crew would go over what each person needed to say, then there was a few practice takes before you got down to the final product. Due to the natural relationship between Matt and Stephen it allowed both of them to demonstrate their 'cheeky' nature and add a few adlib comments.

With the competition now over there's a chance that the 'Mini Me's' may get the opportunity to return to ITV Racing in the future. Stephen thoroughly enjoyed the opportunity but admits he still prefers the commentary side of racing and would rather be away from the front of the camera. The experience can only help his long term career goals and we wish this young talent all the best for his future endeavours.

A SCOTSMANS INFLUENCE IN NEW ZEALAND AND AUSTRALIA

Robert Wilkin was born in 1820 near the Tinwald Downs, Dumfriesshire, and educated at Edinburgh University. At the age of 19 he set sail for Melbourne Australia. Interested in sheep, he eventually became manager of an animal stock dealing firm, and also took the position of a local magistrate.

In 1858 he sailed across the Tasman Sea arriving in Lyttelton New Zealand. By 1871 he was in business in Christchurch as a grain and seed merchant and was also on the council of Canterbury University, At this time he raced thoroughbreds and was one of the founders of the

Robert Wilkin, the colourful Christchurch merchant who imported the first American standardbred blood to New Zealand and passed on top progenitors to Australia. His influence on the sport in Australasia is incalculable.


famous Middle Park Stud. Rohert Wilkin was now to become a considerable force and influence in the building of standardbred family origins in both New Zealand and Australia, as the notation states below his picture (on the left) his influence in the sport is incalculable. And so to the stallions of note procured for clients by Robert Wilkin.

CHILDE HAROLD

Childe Harold was a grandson of Hambletonian 10 out of a Mambrino Chief mare, purchased as a two-vear old in 1873 from A. J. Alexander's Woodburn Farm in Kentucky by Scotsman John Hendrie and exported to Scotland.

In 1874 Childe Harold began his remarkable competitive career, making his debut in the International Handicap Stakes at Liverpool England, being given a favourable handicap by the assessor he capitalised and defeated a field of aged horses winning two preliminary heats, and then the best two of three heats over two miles. His best time over the two mile distance was 5:04.

He then won the Champion Stallion race in London in 2:05 for the mile = the fastest mile time on any track



outside the United States. Later in the year he travelled to Paris and was beaten in the Prix du Gouvernment, by the notable Russian trotter Zouberney. On his return to Scotland he suffered another defeat at Wolverhampton. After that campaign he was never beaten again.

CHILDE HAROLD (1871–1889)

In 1879 he was sent to Paris and won there, moving on, he went to Germany and won three races in Hamburg. His next two winning races were in Russia, and he so impressed the Muscovites that they

believed that the American trotter was better than the Orloff.

On the way back to his home in Scotland he stopped off to win at Glasgow. His final start of the year was in Ireland were he won a feature race in Dublin. The following year 1880 he again won in Paris, but he began to show lameness and was shipped home. In 1881 he trotted a public exhibition at Alexandra Park in London in 2:19, after which he won a number of slow races at home.

Also in 1881 he was shown at Glasgow Horse Show, not only


winning his class but being declared Grand Champion. He then repeated his performance in the Royal Show in London where he was paraded in action before Queen Victoria.

Childe Harold was accompanied throughout his career in America, Europe and Great Britain by his American trainer Alec White. When White arrived in Australia with the horse, he brought with him the first set of hopples seen in the colony. They were to be used as crosshopples to educate young trotters. Such items were used on trotters long before becoming conventional

gear for pacers. In his nine active years, before going to stud, Childe Harold had travelled thousands of miles on railroads, sailing vessels and steamboats. Wherever he landed he achieved results no American stallion had managed before.

During his seven years at stud Childe Harold did service that led him to be hailed as the 'Hambletonian 10' of Australia.

John Hendrie must surely have loved that horse.



And so, it says volumes for the character and persuasiveness of fellow Scotsman **Robert Wilkin** that he was able to secure him for Australian stud owner Andrew Town.
